HAPPINESS DOESN'T HAVE TO COST THE EARTH

Composite indicators are inherently complex and often raise more questions in the mind of the public than they answer. The Happy Planet Index (HPI) was designed to be a relatively simple index that nonetheless holds complexity by explicitly addressing the tension between the desire for high quality of life now whilst not undermining future quality of life. The HPI assesses how well nations are faring by comparing their ultimate outcomes (the delivery of happy and long lives for their citizens) with their fundamental inputs (how much of the planet's finite resources they use).

In a humorous and thought-provoking manner, Nic Marks will introduce us to HPI and guide us in rethinking commonly held assumptions.
